New flowers are coming out almost daily and already there is a shift from snowdrops to daffodils and on to other spring flowers. Because of the new flowers that begin to bloom it's easy to take less notice of the ones that are coming to the end of the flowering because something new and vibrant has taken its place. In following Jesus our characters will be shaped by being in his company and we will then want to share this with others in the way we live and act. As we enter and walk through this Easter season, let's continue to celebrate the wonders of the resurrection, the encounters with Jesus and the empowering of the Holy Spirit.
