

Letter from our Superintendent, Rev Chris Preece

Dear Friends,

Over the past few weeks, I have taken a few longer journeys to different places. These journeys have had varying purposes and all have involved some planning one way or another. Ensuring there was sufficient fuel for the car, having the correct train tickets, sorting out timings or whatever it might be, it all needed to be thought through.

As I was thinking about journeys in the widest sense, we sometimes think of literal journeys but it is also used as a metaphor for life too. Some of the journeys we take are full of anticipation and excitement. Others may be tinged with uncertainty or fear. Journeys of all kinds, literal or metaphorical, can evoke a whole range of emotions.

This three-month period in the life of the Circuit encompasses the seasons of Lent, Holy Week and Easter culminating with Pentecost. It is a time where we consider together so much of the gospel accounts. There are so many twists and turns through this time, and many, many emotions. There are times of great sadness and solemnity, especially on Good Friday but which culminate in the joy of the resurrection. Easter Sunday is where we see the impact of the resurrection and encounter the living Jesus in a new way, and with whom we share our lives today through the Holy Spirit.

As a Circuit this year, we are wanting to emphasise the importance of travelling together through this significant time. Through Holy Week, we have the opportunity to share together in many ways. On Palm Sunday in the evening, we have a Circuit Service which will be held at Castle at 6.30pm and we are pleased to be working alongside Cantus Firmus choir in this. During Holy Week itself, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 7.30pm, we will have a short time together on Zoom where we can reflect in more detail on some of the events of Holy Week. These will prepare us then for Maundy Thursday and Good Friday where there are a variety of services being held across the Circuit. In this important time, I hope as many people as possible will gather through the week as we worship and reflect together.

Our journeying together is also to think about how we grow together and reach out to others. I hope many of us will be able to come together on Saturday 25th April, as we consider our Circuit Mission Plan. This is a great opportunity to be involved in shaping the next few years for the Circuit.

As always, there will be much news in this newsletter of all that is happening around the Circuit. Thank you to everyone who contributes in so many ways. We can also look ahead to all that is to come as we continue to share in our journey of life and discipleship with one another. As we journey together as a Circuit there is much to celebrate and look forward to.



NEWS: from The Circuit

Anna Chaplain – an update from Jastine

AS we step further into the year, it is a joy to reflect on what has been a fruitful and encouraging season for our Anna Chaplaincy ministry across the Circuit.



Our Christmas Carols in care homes were a true blessing. What began as a simple opportunity to sing familiar hymns and share festive cheer quickly became something much deeper, opening doors, building trust, and establishing meaningful relationships with residents, staff, and management teams. Christmas laid a strong foundation for the ministry that is now continuing to grow.

FOLLOWING the carol services, we have established regular Messy Vintage sessions within care homes, and I am delighted to share that these are now booked through until April. We held our first session at Alderwood Care Home in January. It was a wonderful beginning and an important learning experience. Each care home is unique, and residents have varying capacities to engage. This calls us to be flexible, sensitive, and adaptable in our approach.

We quickly learned the importance of adjusting activities in the moment, simplifying where necessary. Messy Vintage is not about producing perfect crafts; it is about presence, shared experience, storytelling, laughter, and moments of spiritual connection. Every smile and conversation matters. Encouragingly, feedback from care homes about Messy Vintage has been very positive. Activities coordinators have shared that residents who are often reserved became animated and engaged during reflective moments, and many thoroughly enjoyed creating the church windows. One team member described it as a “beautiful idea”, while another noted how much residents simply enjoy the activity as it is. This affirmation reassures us that Messy Vintage is meeting a genuine need and bringing joy to residents.

We extend our sincere gratitude to all who have volunteered for Messy Vintage sessions to date. Your dedication, time, and presence have been invaluable in making each session meaningful, and your contribution is greatly appreciated by residents and staff alike.

For some residents, these visits are especially meaningful. Sadly, not all receive regular visitors, and loneliness can weigh heavily. Through sharing a cup of tea/coffee and conversation, we communicate a powerful message: you matter. This quiet ministry of presence often becomes the most profound.

If you feel drawn to take part in Messy Vintage or the coffee gatherings, even occasionally, your involvement would be deeply valued and make a real difference. OUR work with Social Prescribers is also developing well. We are now working with three Social Prescribers, supporting individuals experiencing isolation within the community. At present, four people have been referred to us for befriending support. This partnership highlights the important role the Church can play in addressing loneliness and nurturing belonging beyond our church walls. To support this growing ministry, I am currently undertaking the Spiritual Care training programme run by the Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF), specifically designed for Anna Chaplaincy. This is equipping me further in areas such as ageing, communication, and pastoral sensitivity.

AS this ministry continues to grow, I would be grateful for your prayers:

- for residents, families, and staff in our local care homes
- for Messy Vintage and coffee gatherings, that we may remain adaptable and attentive
- for volunteers, both those already involved and those considering joining
- for our partnerships with Social Prescribers, that we may support those referred with compassion and wisdom

Thank you for your continued encouragement and prayerful support. The seeds planted at Christmas are already bearing fruit. Together, through simple acts of presence and kindness, we are helping to ensure that no one feels forgotten and that the love of Christ is shared in word and action.

And a message from Padre Tim Flowers:

I AM Tim Flowers, originally from Dudley in the Black Country (definitely not Birmingham!), and I am currently working as Chaplain to the Military Corrective Training Centre (MCTC) and the Military Provost Staff (MPS) Regiment in Colchester.

I am married with three grown up children and have a crazy spaniel puppy called Cyrille.

I spent most of my working life, prior to training, in the Steel Stockholding Industry, then latterly in sign manufacture and installation and a short spell working for DWP. I have also been a doorman, concert security and worked as a football steward. I love reading, listening to podcasts and music, and following the ever-increasing misfortunes of West Bromwich Albion.

Following training at Queens College I served as Presbyter in the Tamworth and Lichfield Circuit for 8 years. I joined the Army Reserves in 2014 and then had the opportunity to join the regulars in 2020. Since then, we have lived in London, Northern Ireland, and Scotland before coming to Colchester last year.

My current role as Padre at the Military Corrective Training Centre is probably the most interesting and at times challenging role that I have undertaken. MCTC takes in those sentenced to military custody from all three services and while they are with us we try to get to the underlying reasons for their offending and try to sort it so they are able to rejoin their units, or go back into society if discharged in a better place, equipped with the tools they need to build their lives again and hopefully not reoffend.

The church at MCTC is the detainees safe place, whether they are Christian, belong to other faiths, or have no faith at all they are welcomed every Friday afternoon to a social gathering and Sunday morning when we hold an Act of Worship before social time afterwards.

One of the other areas that the detainees find supportive is the library and we could do with a little help in this. We try to keep the library up to date as much as we can, but it is not always possible to get new books. We can get reference books to help with learning and that is funded by the Army Education Service, but we struggle to replace fiction and non-fiction books. I wondered if anyone would have books they perhaps have read and would like to provide them with a new home. If you could collect them in the churches, I will pop round to collect them if you are kind enough to let us have them. The boys and girls here would greatly appreciate it.

I look forward to meeting you all as I make my way around the circuit.

Circuit Together Day

WE look forward to sharing in our Circuit Together Day on Saturday 7th March from 10am to 2.30pm at Mersea Methodist Church when we will be exploring the theme of being shaped by God. The day will involve some hands-on experience with clay! Holy Week

HOLY Week and Easter are such important and pivotal foundational moments on which our journey of discipleship is based. To spend some time reflecting on this together in real time seems so important as we seek to grow together in our discipleship. If we're not careful, we can rush from Palm Sunday to Easter Day and miss out so much of the gospel story.

For this reason, Rev Chris and Rev Hannah will be leading a week of reflections on Zoom, and hopefully all will have seen the poster in church notices and on noticeboards.

Holy Week will commence in our Circuit with an evening service at Castle on Palm Sunday, 29th March, led by Cantus Firmus, an ecumenical choir with which a number of people from our churches are already connected.

This will be followed by three evening reflections on Zoom as follows:

Monday 30th March - led by Rev Chris
Tuesday 31st March - led by Rev Hannah
Wednesday 1st April - led by Rev Chris

On Maundy Thursday, 2nd April, and Good Friday, there will be face to face services in several churches

On Easter Sunday Alleluia! He is risen! There will be face to face services in churches. There will be no evening Zoom service on that day.


Circuit Service - Palm Sunday Evening

NEWS: from The Churches

Lexden:

OUR chosen charity for Christmas was 'Link to Hope'. They support the elderly and families in Eastern Europe and especially Ukraine at this really difficult time for them. We have already started collecting for next Christmas by bringing in a few items every week and plan to get together later in the year to fill as many shoe boxes as we can. We are also knitting knee blankets - one metre by one metre - which are distributed with the boxes. With this in mind, we would be really grateful for any donations of unwanted wool or if anyone would like to knit some knee blankets for us that would be truly amazing.

Castle:

CHRISTMAS seems like a distant memory but there were highlights to recall. We were pleased that our Junior Church had an active slot in an enjoyable Carol Service and that Carols and Cake, which targeted people who find it difficult to get to church, was well supported thanks to those who provided transport.

A new venture for us was Carols in the Park - a small group of us singing lustily at the entrance to Castle Park on an evening when there was a steady stream of people going to the Castle! Thanks to everyone who gave so generously to our traditional collections for Action for Children. Donations from our Carol service, Christmas day sector service and from our in-house Christmas card amounted to £464.26 and once the appropriate Gift Aid was added it totaled £580.33.

SINCE the last newsletter, all the lighting in the building has been changed to LEDs and we are now planning to complete our double-glazing project.

OUR teenagers continue to meet after morning worship once a month with Rev's Chris and Robin to share in a time of discussion over lunch. We have provided age-appropriate Bible reading notes to help them continue in their studies. The young people will once again be assisting Rev Robin, when he leads our morning worship on Mothering Sunday.

THIS year, as we prepare ourselves for the joy of Easter, we will be using the Lent liturgy published by The Methodist Church at the start of our morning worship. In common with all our friends in the circuit, Easter will be a busy time for us.

On Palm Sunday morning we will be joined by our friends from St Botolph's for a united service led by our Worship Leaders and in the evening, we welcome the Circuit to a service led by Cantus Firmus.

OUR monthly Soup and Snack lunch will take place on Maundy Thursday and we have taken the opportunity to follow this with a service of Holy Communion. Good Friday is the occasion of a sector service of Reflection and Meditation followed by the traditional coffee and hot cross buns....and so to Easter Day when we celebrate our "Risen Lord" by decorating the Easter Cross with flowers and in worship including Holy Communion led by Rev Chris.

The Ark:

WE have had to say a sad farewell to another of our long standing and loyal members, Pam, who died at the beginning of January. Her funeral, followed by a service of thanksgiving and celebration of her long life, both led by Rev Chris, took place mid-February. The service was live-streamed from the Ark to many people, including some of her family and friends living in Gibraltar, with thanks to the Circuit's outside broadcast team!

Pam had a deep-rooted faith and started her Methodist worship in Colchester at the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Culver Street, Colchester.

She spent many years living in West Mersea and when she moved to a bungalow in Colchester, she joined the membership of The Ark. She was a steward, a communion steward, and one of the core team who ran PATTA, a church-led parent and toddler group which continues today under the care of Home Start. Latterly, Pam was instrumental in setting up our Knit and Natter sessions.

Pam's daughter Sarah was a founder member of the Ark and a local preacher in this Circuit. Pam's quiet but steadfast presence is sorely missed.

WE are blessed frequently to have the company of babies in our morning services so have recently purchased a large play mat and a number of charity shop toys to help keep them entertained at the back of the worship area. It is hoped that for visitors arriving with small children the sight of a playmat will be a strong message that all are welcome in our services!

AS we move through Lent and prepare for Easter, we take joy in engaging with our friends around the Circuit. We will join together at Castle on Good Friday, having had our own service of reflection and Holy Communion on Maundy Thursday, with the Easter Sunday service following an early breakfast communion.

WE also look forward to the wedding of Judith and Ron at The Ark at 3pm on Saturday May 16th. It is not often that a wedding takes place at our church! Judith is a steward and one of the founder members of The Ark, and a Circuit steward, and Ron is very well known to many as he is one of our local preachers. The ceremony will, of course, be led by Rev Chris and it will truly be a church family affair. All are welcome at the wedding service.

Wimpole Road:

AS we prepare for the season of Lent by making two large crosses from the trunks of our Christmas trees, it does seem a remarkably short time since they graced the inside and outside of our church.

Looking back over Advent and Christmas, we recall some very enjoyable and meaningful times of worship. The carol service shared with St. Stephen's and St. Margaret's, with musical joy from Boxted Methodist Silver Band, was a fitting occasion to test how we would use our new facilities with a large congregation. It was a lovely way to continue the celebration of worship and praise in joining together in fellowship in the church. For a first attempt, we are pleased to report it went well.

WE were delighted and blessed to host the Circuit Service on 28th December and thank all who prepared and helped in that time together for the last Sunday service of 2025.

FOR most of the winter, we've experienced trouble with the boiler that heats the school rooms and kitchen, resorting to plug in heaters on most occasions the halls have been used. These take the chill off, but to be honest are not really very effective. That boiler has now been officially condemned and is therefore permanently out of use.

So, having successfully completed one project, we now embark on another! Please pray for us as we try to decide which is the best way forward. We will consider the recommendations in the recent ecology report, think again about how the building is used and look to plan a staged project that will have the best long-term outcomes for ecological and economic purposes.

Meanwhile, we continue with our makeshift heating and look forward to warmer weather, while making a contingency plan for the beginning of next winter. When we say 'a warm welcome' awaits, we hope the spirit of our welcome does just that!

The Well:

WE continue on a Tuesday with Community Pantry (fortnightly) and Warm Welcome (every week) during term time - this is also the day when we meet for prayer. During school holidays there are Free Family Forest Fun sessions in Highwoods Country Park when children and their carers have the opportunity to explore different activities such as den building, natural crafts and making fires. Last time, as it was Shrove Tuesday, everyone was cooking pancakes. Packed lunches are provided for the families before they go home.

WE celebrated The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity (18th – 25th January 2025) by having two united events. On Saturday 17th January at The Well, a service was led by Rev Hazel with contributions from representatives from all the churches. It was well attended and was followed by a Coffee Morning for the Outreach Fund. On Sunday 18th January Rev Lynsey led a Forest Church in Highwoods.

WE thank the Circuit for joining in prayers for Stephen. He is still receiving chemotherapy for leukemia and is doing well. Our February Coffee Morning was in aid of Leukemia UK in support of Stephen and his family.

Wivenhoe:

ON the face of it, life at Wivenhoe goes on much as usual. Coffee Morning, Fellowship and Knit and Natter are all well attended. As are our Bible Study sessions hosted by Hannah. Sunday worship continues, but with a slight reduction in regular attendance.

Along with the other four churches in Wivenhoe we are active members of 'Churches Together in Wivenhoe' and will be joining them for various joint activities during Lent, culminating in a Good Friday Walk of Witness followed by reflective worship.

HOWEVER, we have a building that is in a poor state and needing attention. Maintaining and managing is a major problem that we are struggling to address. Also, most of our congregation are at least in their 80s, many with health problems which have worsened in the last few months. This is particularly true of people in key positions in the Church. Our forthcoming Annual and Church Council Meetings will be particularly difficult for us. Your thoughts and prayers for the Church and its people are needed at this difficult time.

West Mersea:

ON the Sunday before Christmas, we had a lovely Carol Service, where we welcomed neighbours from the houses around the church. They all stayed on for our Christmas refreshments of coffee and cake plus the obligatory mince pie!

Our newly-formed singing group made their debut and sang two carols. They now have a name which is "Paws for Singing" as Roger and Margaret are part of the group along with their guide dogs Quiggly and Flo.

OUR Warm Spaces continues Wednesdays from 10am until 2pm. Once a month we welcome our Police Community Support Officers who bring a wealth of information and reassurance to our guests. We have also had a visit from our local Neighbourhood Watch with advice for residents on safety and security at home.

OUR baby and toddler group meet from 9am until 11.30am on a Thursday and continue to support each other, often bringing in outgrown clothes, bedding and toys to share. They are particularly supportive of a new mum who has brought her twins to join us.

FOLLOWING our Eco-Church survey which addressed how we can reduce our carbon footprint, we have identified where we need to implement the suggestions. We will share the information at our Church Council Meeting.

ON Saturday 14th March we will be holding a Quiz Evening hosted by Joe. Food will be provided at 6.30pm before the event. A poster has been sent out around the Circuit. Please let us know if you will be coming so that we can make sure you have plenty to eat. This is a popular event supported by many from around the Circuit and we look forward to seeing you there. WE will also be holding a Coffee morning and sale in May for Christian Aid Week, further details later.

OUR Good Friday Service is at 10am and will be led by Margaret and church members. On Easter Sunday morning there will be a Sunrise Service on the beach at the bottom of Empress Avenue as usual. Sunrise is expected at about 6.15am and we will start gathering at 6am. This has become a special moment, as the stillness of the dawn adds a quiet reflection to the retelling of the story of our risen Lord. If you wish to join us, you will be very welcome.

A day (or more!) in the life of a Circuit Steward – by Judith

I am a lifelong Methodist and have been a member of The Ark since the days of the first house groups where the planting of a church at Highwoods in Colchester took seed some 30 years ago. I grew up with The Ark, was senior steward when the church building was completed, spent many years as a leader in the children's Noah Club, and many hours planning and guiding the annual nativity services. But for most of those years I actually knew very little about Methodism in Colchester and beyond!

Some four years ago I was asked by the then Superintendent Minister if I would consider joining the team of Circuit stewards. I agreed and, to be honest, I have not looked back. What follows is a brief snapshot of my role.

I am a member of the Circuit Leadership Team which, together with other stewards and volunteers, the Superintendent Minister Chris, Rev Hannah and our circuit administrator, provides strategic direction, pastoral care, and administrative oversight for the churches in our Circuit. The CLT reports to the Circuit Meeting which is where any major decisions are taken.

I am also a member of the Circuit Finance Committee. I have never held the role of treasurer and although I am not flustered by money or numbers, I have always been more than happy for someone else to look after church finances. What I am good at, however, is asking questions! If I don't understand what is being talked about I will ask. For if I don't know, it is fairly certain that I won't be alone, and while I found the first few finance meetings rather daunting, I was happy to listen and learn and now consider myself to be the layman's spokesman!

Circuit stewards are also allocated a church to report to and receive feedback from. I have the pleasure of being the Circuit representative to Wimpole Road and I attend their meetings of church council, to update the council on Circuit matters and take back to the CLT any issues of concern.

Being a Circuit Steward can also lead to other interesting roles. The Bedfordshire, Essex and Hertfordshire Methodist District – of which the Colchester Circuit is a part – carries out annual inspections of manses, talking to the Ministers about any concerns they may have with their homes or the way their Circuit looks after them. The volunteers who undertake these inspections are Circuit stewards and for the last two years I have been one of those volunteer inspectors, visiting manses (two a year) and reporting back to the District Manses Committee which is chaired by the Chair of the District. We work in teams of two and never visit manses in our own Circuit, so my inspections have so far taken me to look around manses in Maldon, Chelmsford, Bedford and Biggleswade. What a joy it is to meet ministers in other Circuits and to find out more about Methodist life beyond Colchester!

Another part of my role as Circuit Steward is to gather together the items of news which create this quarterly newsletter.

Being a member of the CLT enables me to know what is going on around our Circuit of churches and learn from their experiences and this, in turn, enables me to feed back to my own leadership team at The Ark.

We are not seven churches in a Circuit, we are a Circuit of seven churches and can all learn from each other and grow together!
